Compensatory strategies below the behavioural surface in autism: a qualitative study This article explores compensatory strategies in autism, and suggests that compensatory strategies might be a barrier to a diagnosis of autism, and their use might have negative consequences on mental health and wellbeing.

<u>Joint Attention in Infancy and the Emergence of Autism</u> This study used novel live eye-tracking technology to evaluate the degree to which autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is related to reduced responding to others' joint attention bids in infancy.

<u>Learning from tragedies: an analysis of alcohol-related Safeguarding Adult Reviews published in 2017</u> In 2017, 5,507 deaths in England were directly attributable to alcohol, an increase of 11% since 2006, while hospital admissions caused primarily by alcohol were 17% higher over the same period. Vulnerable adults are particularly at risk.
