### Self-testing for sexually transmitted infections increases diagnoses while reducing costs

In a new study, people took samples from 3 different sites in the body then pooled the 3 swabs in one container. The swabs were analysed in a single test for the common bacterial infections, gonorrhoea and chlamydia. Self-testing may cause less embarrassment for service users, improve uptake, and free up clinicians' time.

# Increased rates of organ damage are seen in people discharged from hospital after COVID-19

People discharged from hospital after being treated for COVID-19 have increased rates of organ damage, readmission and death, compared to the general population. New research suggests that COVID-19 might place a greater burden on healthcare systems than was previously thought.

# New report highlights persistent inequalities and continued inequitable care for pregnant women

Findings reflect how pregnant women are being put at greater risk due to clinicians focusing on their pregnancy, rather than the woman's own health. This is particularly the case for the women who died from cancer, with their symptoms often being attributed to pregnancy and not further investigated.

### MPs and health experts call for alcohol marketing restrictions to protect those in recovery

The latest report from the Alcohol Health Alliance (AHA) has found that the "constant bombardment" of alcohol marketing at celebrations such as Christmas and sports events makes it difficult for those in active addiction and recovery to fully participate in everyday life.

# NHS mental health service users report poor experiences of care – and worsening mental health

# United Nations Climate Change Conference of the Parties 26 (COP26)

The UN Climate Change Conference of the Parties 26 (COP26) took place from 31 October to 12 November 2021. Some experts have claimed that <u>COP26 finally framed climate change as a public health issue</u>, and that message resonated more than it has in previous years. For the first time, the World Health Organisation sponsored a health pavilion at COP26. This made health visible at the Conference, emphasising the links between climate and health.
